

Analysis on the Contribution from Indonesian Vision for 2100 to the Pact for the Future

This brief examines how insights from Indonesian Vision for 2100 contribute to the Pact for the Future 2024, emphasizing shared goals in collaboration and technology, youth employment, climate change and youth empowerment, . Developed through focused group discussions with over 90 children and youth, along with the Girls Summit 2024—a collaboration between Plan Indonesia and the UN Foundation—Indonesian Vision for 2100 captures the voices of young people, especially girls, in Indonesia.

<p>Inclusive and Quality Education for Lifelong Learning.</p>	<p>Invest in accessible, safe, inclusive, and quality education for all, with a focus on lifelong learning, vocational training, and digital literacy.” (Page 60)</p>	<p>Envisions a holistic education system that fosters critical thinking, creativity, and vocational skills, accessible to all segments of society to prepare young people for a sustainable future.</p>
<p>Climate Action and Sustainable Urban Planning.</p>	<p>“Promote resilience to climate change, integrate climate adaptation strategies, and create sustainable urban infrastructure.” (Page 18)</p>	<p>Envisions climate-adapted infrastructure, disaster-resilient cities, and sustainable urban planning to address environmental challenges, emphasizing green spaces, renewable energy, and sustainable transportation.</p>

<p>Bridging the Digital Divide with Equitable Technology Access.</p>	<p>“Aim for universal access to digital technologies at affordable rates, ensuring accessibility in underserved and remote areas.” (Page 43)</p>	<p>Proposes strategies to provide equitable digital access across Indonesia, including rural and underserved areas, to ensure that technological advancements benefit all citizens.</p>
<p>Encouraging Community-Based Environmental Stewardship.</p>	<p>“Strengthen efforts to protect biodiversity and ecosystems through community-based initiatives.” (Page 29)</p>	<p>Advocates for local conservation efforts, with an emphasis on involving communities in preserving biodiversity, protecting ecosystems, and promoting sustainable practices at the grassroots level.</p>
